2 Oninotegata (Demons' Hand Prints on the Rocks) (Mitsuishi Shrine)

he three granite rocks on the grounds of Mitsuishi Shrine are said to be the origin of the prefecture's name, Iwate. The legend has it that Oni lemons) were forced to leave its tegata (handprints) on the rocks as a promise to never act evil again. Thus the name wate (Iwa= granite, Te= hand). Sansa Odori dance is also said to have originated here.



Construction started with Nobunao Nanbu, and it became a castle for he successive feudal lords in 1633 (Kan-ei 10). Granite used for the stone walls are from Morioka and is known as one of Japan's Top 100 Castles. It has also been designated as a National Historic Site.



9 Nanshoso Admission Charged D-4 The residence of Yasugoro Segawa, a businessman from Morioka. The site

Takashi Hara, known as a "Commoner Prime Minister," was born in this Morioka clansman's house. The sprawling residence was constructed in 1850 (Ka-ei 3), and covered around 661 square meters (approximately 250 subo). About a fifth of that original space has been preserved, and now sits adjacent to the HARA-KEI Memorial Museum 1. 17 Gohyakurakan (500 Arhats) (Ho-onji Temple)




